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About the Event Result Report

This report compiles the program and outcome of the 7th Anniversary of the September 18th HWPL World Peace Summit, which was held online on 18 September 2021.


This event, held under the theme of “Advancing the DPCW’s Peace Agenda in the New Normal: Concerted Action for Sustainable Peace,” was attended by about 2,500 people in 157 countries. Despite the pandemic, those working with HWPL did not dawdle or hesitate, but they met with citizens all around the world in a new way, discussing how to promote peace and cooperating with each other. By doing so, they tried to make an opportunity to deal with the current crisis.

Since HWPL’s 8th Annual Commemoration of the Declaration of World Peace in May, where the new cases of “Legislate Peace” activities were introduced, citizen-led peacebuilding initiatives and various activities tailored to different communities and regions have been conducted for global coexistence and harmony. Communication and interaction through online platforms brought about positive changes, leading to more advanced outcomes of peace initiatives.

Some of the activities highlighted here include online study sessions with the DPCW Handbook, online seminars for discussing solutions to human rights issues that emerged during the pandemic, education on the culture of peace, and religious peace camp. These activities were joined by citizens who hoped to learn about the value of peace and ways to resolve conflicts.

This report introduces about the media forum, where journalists set forth the 10 principles that media workers need to follow in the new normal era, based on their expertise and insight. Also, interviews with various participants show the process of peace education. While educators were trained and students were taught, they went through positive changes together. As a result of peace education, a peace garden is being built in Ilocos Norte, Philippines.

The various activities of the IWPG and the IPYG, the two wings of HWPL, are explained in the progress report and commemorative addresses. The details and outcomes of seminars, forums, and educational programs of 2021 can be



seen in the Special Features and Appendices of this report.

Preparation for the post-COVID era is an important task not only for the world but also for us who hope for peace. Please see the results of HWPL peace initiatives and use the report to devise plans and strategies to realize peace in more diverse fields for 2022.

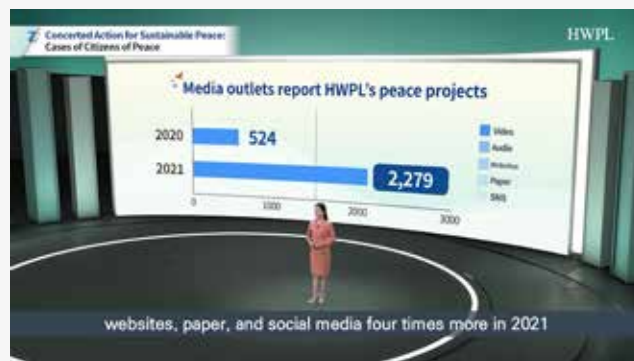

7th Anniversary of the September 18th HWPL World Peace Summit

- Advancing the DPCW's Peace Agenda in the New Normal:
Concerted Action for Sustainable Peace -

1. Introduction

The 7th Anniversary of the September 18th HWPL World Peace Summit was held online on 18 September 2021. Leaders from all sectors, including politics, religion, youth, education, media, and civic society, gathered from around the world in Seoul, South Korea, on 18 September 2014 and promised to collaborate with HWPL to achieve sustainable peace. Since then, HWPL has hosted the HWPL World Peace Summit every 18 September to discuss ideas to achieve peace—a common goal of the global society—and share the outcome of different initiatives as well as present new plans. We recognize the fluid environment in which humankind faces challenges brought by a disease that threatens our coexistence and harmony as the new normal. This year's event will present the progress made and plans for the future in efforts to advance the peace agenda amid such changing international settings.

In the midst of the new set of global challenges such as healthcare, violent conflicts, and natural disasters, Concerted Action for Sustainable Peace will be presented at the event and will echo the pledge for peace made by the global community and HWPL in 2014—an illustration of present and future collaborative efforts of peace messengers to pass on the legacy of peace to generations to come. This event is hosted by Heavenly Culture, World Peace, Restoration of Light (HWPL), with the support of the International Peace Youth Group (IPYG) and the International Women's Peace Group (IWPG)—two organizations that are creating a global peace network with HWPL.

2. Background

During the past century, the two world wars instilled humankind with the yearning for a world of peace, free of aggression. But even after the United

Nations was formed, the Korean War and other conflicts of various scales tormented global citizens and nations. As conflicts around the globe diversified in their causes and entities, their frequency and scale also rose. The cause of conflicts expanded from security-related aspects such as military and politics to non-security-related ones such as religion, ethnicity, culture, environment, and resources. Entities of conflicts are no longer bound to state actors but now include non-state actors. The expansion of cause and entity of conflicts highlights the need for peace for a broader spectrum and actors.

In addition, the COVID-19 pandemic had an overrunning impact in all corners of the globe. The spread of the disease inevitably changed the course of future progress, which had been based on past achievements. The pandemic also exacerbated other non-disease-related issues, namely economic downturns, political divide, misinformation and disinformation that worsened the confusion, misconceptions and discrimination against minorities, and the lack of access to education and welfare. These call for a fundamental change in the way humankind strives.

3. The Event

HWPL presented the peace principles as a solution to the current global challenge of conflicts in the 10 articles and 38 clauses of the Declaration of Peace and Cessation of War (DPCW). The premise of the Declaration is that citizens are the main actors of peacebuilding. It proposes the global community to establish peace by laying legal foundations at the international level in order to reach governance of fairness instead of a world governed by power, manifested as violence, coercion, and the fist. Through Article 1 and Article 7, the DPCW deals with the principles of peace that nations must uphold, which are discussed and clarified through the UN and other IGOs. Article 8 Freedom of religion; Article 9 Religion, ethnic identity and peace; and Article 10 Spreading a culture of peace, sets out to propose principles in dealing with the rising peace challenges. Notably, the articles identify peace actors as not only nation-states, but also as international organizations and all citizens—making clear that every member of the global society counts in peacebuilding efforts.

In connection, HWPL organizes “Legislate Peace” (LP) which promotes voluntary peace activities carried out by citizens and leaders in 193 countries

worldwide. Although this year was marked by changing environments brought by the pandemic, peace efforts that were unhindered by a new set of limitations will be shared at the event. Some peace activities surprisingly garnered even greater support and progress compared to pre-pandemic records.

The content of the DPCW has made textbook material for future lawyers. The WARP Office's Comparison of Religious Scriptures sessions moved online and stimulated lively conversations on the true meaning of religion and discovering the meaning of peace in different faiths. Participants of the HWPL Religious Youth Peace Camps are invited to see past the misconceptions spinning intolerance and hostility and take part in conversations toward understanding and coexistence. Places remembered as warzones, where countless lives were lost, are now transforming into parks with peace monuments serving communities as a place to celebrate peace. Prayer meetings led by religious leaders reach across multiple religions and continue spreading the message of blessings, wishing for the well-being, healthy lives, and harmony for all people regardless of their religious backgrounds. Peace Education is carried out across places where children are handed guns before pens and learn to kill and in communities that are scourged by misdemeanor, violence, and drug abuse. It builds up future youth leaders who will spread the message of peace. Journalists take action to prevent the generation of misinformation in a pandemic. They pass on information that promotes democracy, and they work hard to educate communities to discern information. Such actions of people from all walks of life are what make concerted efforts for peace, and it will serve as a blueprint that helps build sustainable peace in a pandemic-hit new normal.

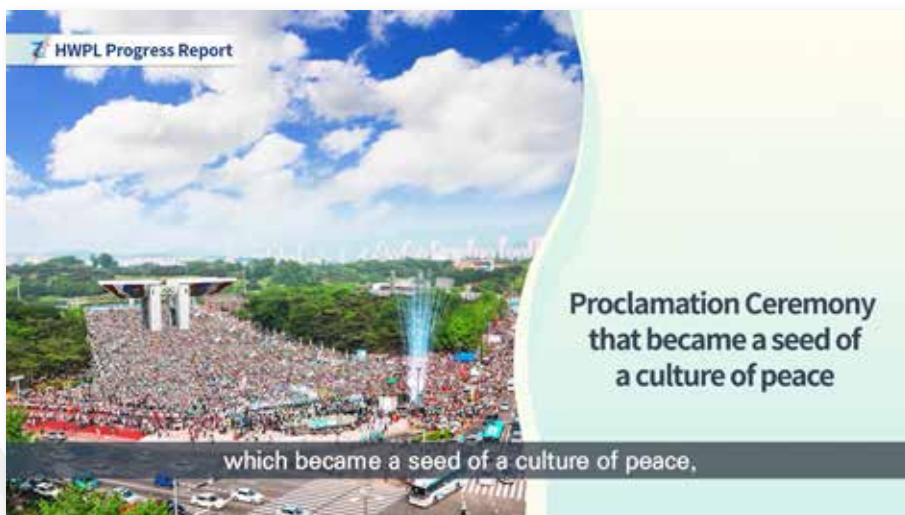
H.E. Lucio Edwin Gutiérrez Borbúa Republic of Ecuador The 43th President

Progress Report



Greetings to the family of peace. I am Kang Tae-ho, Managing Director of Heavenly Culture, World Peace, Restoration of Light. Transcending nationalities, religions, and ethnic backgrounds, with the single goal of building a legacy of peace for future generations, HWPL is leading its peace activities. Allow me to give you a Progress Report of HWPL.



HWPL was founded on 25 May 2013. It is an international peace organization associated with the UN Economic and Social Council and the UN Department of Global Communications. It closely collaborates with organizations working as its two wings, the International Peace Youth Group (IPYG) and

the International Women's Peace Group (IWPG). Forming an international peace network together, we join hands with leaders from various sectors and communities around the world in our peace activities.

On the founding day of HWPL, 25 May 2013, HWPL Chairman Man Hee Lee proclaimed the Declaration of World Peace in front of the Peace Gate in Seoul, Korea. "With this Declaration, the work of world peace and restoration has begun," was the final statement of the Declaration. The people gathered in front of the Peace Gate that day included 30,000 youths from 130 countries. After the Declaration, those young people went back to their home countries and led various peace activities in their communities starting with peace walks, which became a seed of a culture of peace—now yielding a progress of peace as follows.



On 24 January 2014 Chairman Man Hee Lee mediated a peace agreement to the leaders of politics and religion in Mindanao, the Philippines, a region that had bloodshed from political and religious conflict for four decades

that produced victims numbering up to 120 thousand. His proposition of a peace agreement led to the first steps of action to resolve conflict from both sides and to work toward peace and prosperity—resonating with the true meaning and teachings of religion. The day the peace agreement was signed, thousands of young adults in Mindanao started a peace walk and shouted out for peace in the streets. Once a conflict zone, Mindanao is now home to a peace monument, a symbol of the promise for peace that celebrates the Mindanao Peace Agreement. January 24th was made HWPL Day. It is a day for citizens and leaders of Mindanao to remember the promise for peace and work to establish peace in the region. The Mindanao Peace Agreement is a milestone that highlights HWPL's tireless efforts for the cessation of war and establishing sustainable peace.



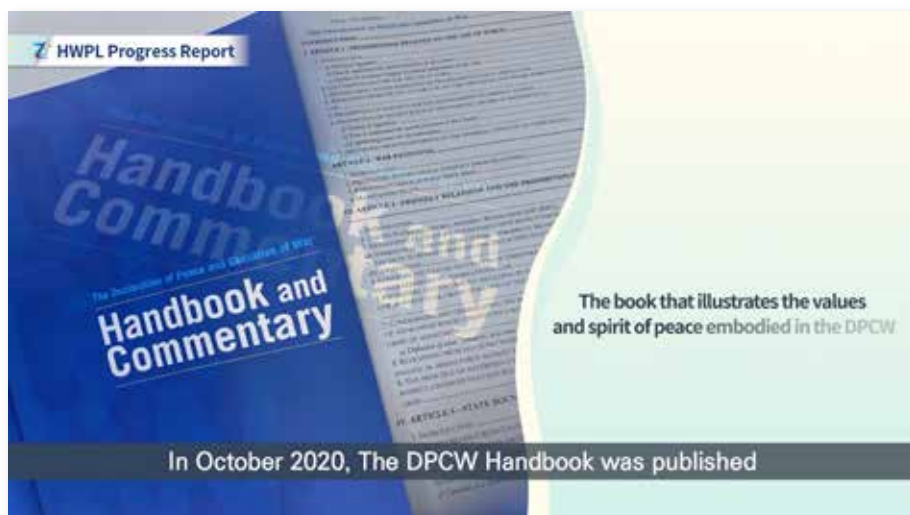
On 18 September 2014, in Seoul, South Korea, HWPL hosted about 200 thousand people from all walks of life, including 4,000 leaders from 170 countries. It was one of the largest in scale for events hosted by an NGO—known as September 18th HWPL Peace Summit. At the main conference of that Summit, participants signed two very important agreements for the coexistence and co-prosperity of humankind and for peace and the cessation of war. One was the Agreement to Propose the Enactment of International Law for the Cessation of Wars and World Peace, which was signed by present and former heads of state and leading figures. The other agreement was the World Alliance of Religions Agreement which was signed by religious leaders. At the same time, leaders of civil organizations pledged to encourage the fulfillment of the two agreements from the community level.

This year marks the 7th anniversary of that very day. HWPL's unrelenting

work is directed at fulfilling the pledges made before global citizens and establishing lasting peace and the cessation of wars.



On the first anniversary of the HWPL Peace Summit in 2015, HWPL inaugurated the ILPC, the HWPL International Law Peace Committee, joined by renowned international law experts. Working with Chairman Lee, the ILPC drafted the 10 articles and 38 clauses of the Declaration of Peace and Cessation of War, a concrete solution for peace executable at all levels of society. The DPCW was proclaimed worldwide on 14 March 2016. Since then, the DPCW has won global support from various social arenas, and HWPL is currently working to submit the DPCW to the UN General Assembly—aiming for the adoption of an international legal instrument for peace.



In October 2020, The DPCW Handbook was published by the ILPC members. The book illustrates the values and spirit of peace embodied in the DPCW. To

this day, law professors, students, and citizens across 20 universities in India, Bangladesh, and Tunisia enrolled in and completed the DPCW Handbook Discussion Project.



A group of peace messengers led by Chairman Lee of HWPL embarked on a world tour for peace to build global solidarity for peace. Through the 31 rounds of the world peace tour, the peace messengers had countless encounters that reaffirmed the importance of building peace solidarity. As a result, HWPL named 200 members to the Peace Advisory Council and appointed 610 Publicity Ambassadors. Also, HWPL formed partnerships in the form of MOAs or MOUs on peace with 265 organizations globally. Notably, HWPL entered MOUs with the International Centre for Black Sea-Baltic Studies and Consensus Practices, whose members are former heads of Eastern European countries, and also with Pan-African Parliament, which is the legislative body of the African Union consisting of 55 African countries. In addition, at a function at the UN Headquarters, Chairman Man Hee Lee presented the 10 articles and 38 clauses of the DPCW to the UN Permanent Representatives of 145 countries, who responded to his speech with a standing ovation. As such, HWPL has formed an international peace network and garnered support for the DPCW.

HWPL is running the "Legislate Peace" (LP) project which is a global initiative to ensure peace through international law. For the past eight years, over three million citizens of the world have participated in peace walks and have campaigned for peace and the cessation of war. The signature campaign to support the DPCW gathered 730,000 signatures across 176 countries. To fulfill the World Alliance of Religions Agreement signed at the 2014 HWPL



World Peace Summit, HWPL is running 265 WARP Offices in 129 countries where religious leaders discuss ways to resolve interfaith conflicts, one of the main causes of war, and establish lasting peace. Even during the pandemic, participants of the WARP Office did not falter in their endeavors for peace. Since January 2021, more than 3,000 sessions of scriptural dialogue took place in just seven months—a 340 percent increase over the previous year.



To pass on the values of peace to global citizens and future generations, HWPL signed MOUs and MOAs on peace education with 214 educational institutes worldwide. It also develops peace education curriculums and teaching materials and provides training for educators. The online peace educator training program completed its 517th session. From 2020, the online peace educator training course recorded 2,023 enrollments.



Even in times of a pandemic, media agencies working with HWPL are reporting on continued peace activities such as the promotion of human rights, relief efforts, humanitarian support, volunteer work, and education in different parts of the world. This network of peace media comprises 1,900 media outlets in 162 countries from 2020. The Peace Media Network reported HWPL peace activities approximately 5,400 times. Meanwhile, HWPL held the Peace Media Forum to suggest the role of the media in promoting peace.



In coalition with 851 NGOs in 111 countries, the International Peace Youth Group, IPYG, forms a global youth network. IPYG is running a global-scale discussion platform for youths called YEPW, or the Youth Empowerment Peace Workshop. The workshop discusses ways for the youth to take an active role in overcoming challenges brought by the pandemic. Youth organizations from over 50 countries joined the workshop and carried out projects dealing with pandemic-related issues, including disruption in education and the

discrimination and violence against marginalized groups.

Starting from June, IPYG also launched an online educational program called YEPC, Youth Empowerment Peace Class to resolve the learning loss of the youth and help build up their ability. Currently, around 450 youth leaders from 35 countries have enrolled in YEPC and are growing as young messengers of peace.

The ceaseless efforts for realizing lasting peace and the cessation of war—HWPL's work for peace—was made possible by you, the family of peace, and your dedication to building peace. Even during a global crisis, the culture of peace will only shed a brighter light that brings us together and eventually bring an end to wars from our global community and leave an everlasting legacy of peace for future generations. As we celebrate the 7th Anniversary of the September 18th HWPL Peace Summit, I thank all members of the family of peace once again for taking part in this historic moment. With that, I conclude the progress report.

Concerted Action for Sustainable Peace: Actual Cases

1) Cases of the “Legislate Peace” Project



Hello, everyone. My name is Lee Jae-yeol, and I am a member of HWPL.

A. Legislate Peace Project

It is a pleasure to meet all of you. HWPL is conducting the "Legislate Peace" (LP) project, an initiative to garner support for the DPCW and achieve its adoption at the international level.

Starting this year, we have launched new campaigns to bring fresh energy to our society that has grown weary of the pandemic.

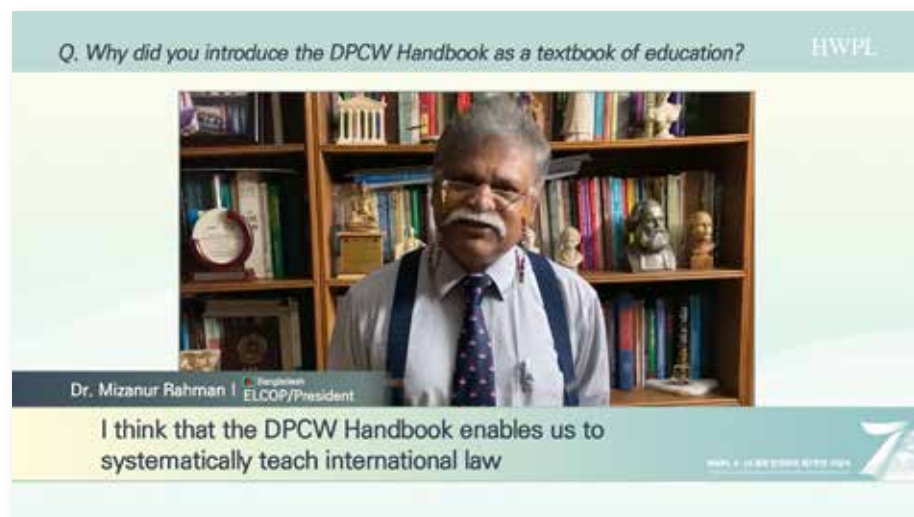
B. Online Study Group on the DPCW Handbook

One of the campaigns, which I would like to introduce today, is an online study group on the DPCW Handbook. This handbook explains the 10 articles and 38 clauses of the DPCW in detail. The study aims to teach citizens about the values and spirit of peace embodied in each article and urge them to

support the DPCW. The idea of the handbook was first suggested at the 7th International Law Peace Committee Meeting in 2019 and was developed step by step even in the midst of the pandemic. As a result, the handbook was finalized in October 2020. The handbook includes content on each article of the DPCW as well as related international issues, which can open in-depth discussions on why peace is necessary and how it can be achieved.

Dr. Mizanur Rahman, dean and professor of law at the University of Dhaka, recruited law school students from 14 universities in Bangladesh and India and held online study sessions using the DPCW Handbook.

Interview 1



Dr. Mizanur Rahman | Bangladesh | ELCOP | President

Q1. Why did you introduce the DPCW Handbook as a textbook of education?

I think that the DPCW Handbook enables us to systematically teach international law and the essence of peace to these students and others. And that enables these students to become lecturers in the following course.

Q2. Please tell us how you felt while hosting the DPCW Handbook Discussion Project.

It was very interesting to see how these students become lecturers in international [laws] and ambassadors of peace while they talked to others about the DPCW Handbook and how they become ambassadors of peace in

the whole world.

Q3. Do you have any plans after the DPCW Handbook Discussion Project?

Obviously I do have, because after the instructions in the DPCW Handbook on peace, I want to become a lecturer in the DPCW Handbook and inculcate the message of DPCW peace through my students. So I will be a lecturer not only at my home, but I want to reach out to the students elsewhere in other cities and in the region as such.

The DPCW handbook online study sessions have been held in 20 schools in Bangladesh, India, and Tunisia since November 2020. Students analyzed and explored the DPCW through discussions and presentations, while legal experts and professors participated as mentors.

Q1. Please feel free to tell us what you felt special about participating in the DPCW Handbook Discussion Project

Joining the six month-long DPCW Handbook Discussion Project was a wonderful peace learning experience for me. The whole course was quite special. But one thing that I will always particularly cherish about this course was its particular focus on the importance of peace education. Throughout

this Discussion Project, I came to learn about the importance of peace education through the DPCW. And I was persuaded to believe how the importance of peace education can be an effective tool to end wars all over the world. I joined this course with some brilliant mentors and enthusiastic learners from home and abroad. Throughout this project, I was trained on the importance of peace education by putting various human rights crisis in context. I believe that the knowledge that I have gained from this course will be a great contribution for society and I feel really really great about participating this course for this reason.

Q2. Please tell us what your future plans are.

I am currently a final year law student at University of Dhaka, Bangladesh, and as I have also graduated from the DPCW course, I aim to join the “Peace Education and Culture Based on the DPCW for Citizens” as a lecturer to spread the importance of peace education among the ordinary people. It is because I believe DPCW has the potentiality to end the crisis like the ongoing Rohingya crisis we are facing in Bangladesh or the current human rights crisis in Afghanistan.

And that's why I aim to teach the ordinary people about the peace education—particularly people in Bangladesh, Afghanistan, or various other countries like that all over the world. Thank you.

Peace and Culture Education Based on the DPCW Citizens



Like Arifur Rahman said, HWPL is planning on expanding its educational program on the DPCW Handbook to include the general public. As the first step, an online session was held for the University of Dhaka's Department of Peace and Conflict students, where they watched a lecture video of Peace Culture Education based on the DPCW. The students will hold a session every month to prepare learning material tailored for the general public. Peace Culture Education will not only enhance citizens' understanding of international law but also shed light on steps that they need to take to create a peaceful future.

C. Online Seminar on Human Rights

Next, I would like to introduce the Online Seminar on Human Rights. Since September of last year, HWPL has held webinars inviting people from different walks of life to seek solutions to the issues of human rights violations that have emerged during the pandemic. The webinars were held on topics such as domestic violence, women's rights, and religious minorities, and was attended by over 2,300 people in 75 countries.



Through the Online Seminar on Human Rights, HWPL is offering a peace platform where governments, local organizations, and citizens can interact and work together to resolve issues that threaten peace in everyday life. We will continue to provide the platform to create a synergy of peace among various sectors and organizations across the globe.

D. Citizens Around the World to Propose Peace Policies

Moreover, HWPL is listening to the voices of peace-yearning citizens around the world to propose peace policies. In line with implementing the UN Sustainable Development Goal 16, "Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions," and Goal 17, "Partnerships for the Goals," HWPL has had discussions with Malian government officials and civic groups in Mali, Africa, since November 2020. As a result, a peace policy proposal was submitted to the Malian government in September this year. Until the DPCW is implemented at the international level, HWPL will not stop urging leaders around the world to support it. We have only one goal: to create a safe and peaceful world for everyone under a law of peace. In this new normal era, we HWPL promise to stay connected with all of you and pave the way of peace with innovative and consistent efforts.

2) Cases of Alliance of Religion



Greetings, I am Park Su-Jeong and I will be presenting on the HWPL WARP Office's peace projects.

A. WARP offices for the alliance of religions

WARP Offices were established to fulfill the pledge made during the 2014 HWPL World Peace Summit for the alliance of religions. With 265 offices operating in 129 countries, the activities of the WARP Offices have been growing despite the pandemic. For seven months since January 2021, 3,089 scripture comparison discussions were held, which is a 340 percent hike compared to the previous year.

Such active engagement was possible thanks to the endeavors of countless religious leaders. At the WARP Office Comparison of Scriptures, like-minded leaders came together for peace, the essence of religion, and they collaborated for religious harmony through discussions and comparing religious texts. In trying to overcome the global challenges, faith leaders around the globe have set examples and inspired citizens. Let's listen to religious leaders who have been striving for peace.

Actually, you know according to the scriptures, religion is only one, and God is only one, but the paths are different. So every individual has a different path. So, we have to put them together.

And definitely, this understanding and harmony between faiths is a huge

contributing factor to reducing conflict and war in our world. We've been a bit distracted with COVID, but the wars continue, and the suffering as a result of those wars of innocent families continues. And so I think that, you know, our group is a very small group. But when I think that these groups are happening all over the world, it's not a small thing. And you know it, it kind of reminds me of a network of light. And it's like, this network is over our planet. And there are people, like-minded people holding the same sentiments, aiming for the same peace on our planet. And I think there's a lot of power in the collective. And it took one man to take the first step. But now there is this amazing network of light that's happening.

As we have seen, the efforts of many religious leaders will help increase knowledge from the comparative studies of scriptures, and ultimately lead us to build peace among religions by finding the most trustworthy scripture. Achieving an alliance of religions will, in effect, lay the foundation for peace and harmony for humanity. However, the endeavors of the leaders do not stop at having comparison discussions.

While carrying out practical religious studies in discussions, they are also expanding activities to promote the culture of peace needed in local communities. In particular, there have been efforts to build WARP Offices in temples to spread a culture of religious peace. A case in point is a Buddhist temple located in South Korea.

B. Efforts to spread a culture of religious peace Eungok Temple, South Korea

Eungok Temple located in Jeongeup, Jeollabuk-do Province, under the Paradise Jogye Order of Korean Buddhism. The Founding Master Eungok was deeply inspired by the Declaration of Unification proclaimed by Chairman Man Hee Lee on the 65th anniversary of Korea's National Liberation Day on 15 August. Master Eungok opened the temple gates to HWPL WARP Office. On 12 August, a signboard unveiling ceremony was held, declaring the temple as a WARP Office, a site for spreading a culture of peace. Sided with exhibitions on religious culture, peace blossomed on the meaningful day at the temple.



EUNGOK Republic of Korea | The Founder of the Paradise Jogye Order of Korean Buddhism, Eungok Seonwon, the Buddhist master

The Declaration of the Unification is not just for a few to listen to and enjoy. I believe that all citizens and people of North and South Korea need to implore and call for the reunification of the two Koreas and world peace with clenched fists. That is why, I joined the world peace movement as a monk to observe and support the strength stored in the declaration until my last day. As I witnessed the peace work on site, I was deeply inspired by Chairman Man Hee Lee, who was a leader of age, standing at the forefront and leading others with guidance. I also thought that I want to be of help even if it's as small as a grain of sand in a desert, so I decided to take part in the movement. As much as humanly possible, until I die, I will be at the front for the reunification of Korea. Thank you very much.

C. HWPL Religious Youth Peace Camp

Anyone who yearns for peace can join HWPL, and when we work together as one, peace will surely be achieved. However, peace among religions cannot be made with only the efforts of religious leaders. Civil society is a key player in opposing war and protecting peace, so, its participation is absolutely necessary.

That is why the WARP Office has prepared a platform for people across the



globe to experience various religions and take an active part in WARP Offices through the “HWPL Religious Youth Peace Camp.” In 23 countries including Finland and India, 36 online peace camps took place. Citizens not only got to experience other religions at the camp, but also held discussions and interactive games to learn about cases of religious conflict and gain insight on how to resolve them. In August, a youth peace camp was held with participants from three European countries and offered various programs such as times for declaring a statement for global peace and group prayers.

Bharat Sharma South Africa | South African Hindu Maha Sabha (SAHMS), Youth Member

I actually think it was when everyone finished their discussions and we were back in the main group and the group representatives were talking—I think it’s how well they spoke and how different their views were. It was very impressive to see other people’s perspectives like “Oh, I didn’t even think of this.” I think the best way to become educated and to become sort of like a global citizen is to speak to people of different views, talk to them, respect their views, and put yourself in their shoes. So, I think that’s very important to do to grow as a person and to become a better person. So, I think organizations like HWPL can definitely help that and facilitate becoming that very person.

The final video that they played regarding the Island in the Philippines, where there was this one moment where the peace worker was at the meeting where the two factions were, and he just gave this passionate speech. They played a little section from that and that was really special. And when they showed the peace monument being unveiled. That was really powerful to see like the symbol that is applicable for everyone. Everyone can relate to that symbol, so that was really nice. I think it’s good to have something like that regularly and to have it be exposed to the broader public so that you can change the perception of “Religions, they only cause war.” You can add something fun like you did with the board game. You can maybe expand on that so that it can be a thing on people’s calendar, where they say, “Oh yeah!

I go to this month's thing.”



HWPL WARP Offices continue to take a step forward to spread a culture of sustainable peace. To serve as the practical strength in realizing lasting peace,



which is the most valuable legacy for future generations, WARP Offices will continue to widen the range of peace activities that resonate with civil society and spur active engagement—a true alliance of the world which transcends religion, ethnicity, and nationality, and where disputes among religions are replaced with dialogues!

We ask for your participation in HWPL WARP Office's movement to build sustainable peace. "We are one!" I hope, together, we can be the ones to achieve peace. Thank you.

3) Cases of Citizens of Peace



The enthusiasm of the participants is inspiring. Hello everyone. My name is Lee Ji-eun, your presenter for today.

In Africa, they say it takes a village to raise a child. This tells us that a child's upbringing is not just the responsibility of one family alone – it takes parents, schools, neighbors, the local community, and governments working together. Building sustainable peace also requires the collaborative work of the global community.

As we saw today, HWPL made it possible for concerted action for sustainable peace to take root. Educators and journalists are working with HWPL, and by inspiring citizens with the spirit of peace, they are spreading the culture of peace.

A. Media Association for Global Peace

In times of disaster and pandemics, people turn to the media to make informed decisions. This makes their role even more critical in challenging times. But now, journalists are reaching for a higher goal beyond the single-dimensional task of relaying catastrophic events. The media now realizes

they can be agents that help society resolve disaster situations. Starting from 2020, we have been constantly reminded of how valuable it is to have a sense of peaceful normalcy, and the media coverage of HWPL's peace activities shot up. The media reported HWPL's peace projects via video, audio, websites, paper, and social media four times more in 2021 compared to the previous year.



In addition, "Voice of Peace," a media forum for journalists was hosted in February. The forum discussed social trends and future responses through the lens of journalists' expertise and perspective. There, journalists and news media voiced a message of self-reflection and set ten principles for the media industry in the new normal era. Journalists at the forum volunteered to be messengers who highlight the role of journalism in peacebuilding efforts.

Mr. Supalak Ganjanakhundee Thailand | Former Editor of The Nation Newspaper

I agree with the ten recommendations at the outcome of the February meeting for a number of reasons. Given that the COVID pandemic keeps people away from social engagement, therefore, the media will play a crucial role in bringing news and information to the people. Media in an individual country cannot work alone to spread information, so it is important for media to cooperate with one another in order to share correct and accurate information to the public.

B. HWPL Peace Education Program



Education is a solution and fundamental answer to challenges faced by almost all sectors. To bring up future peace leaders, HWPL's Peace Education Process provides set of textbooks on peace and in-class activities such as learning sections, presentations, and discussions that allow students to systematically develop values of peace. In addition, the peace educator training program and its guidelines are provided to schools and educational institutions so that teachers who completed it can teach it in schools and local communities. HWPL's Peace Education provides two tracks: student learning and teacher training. So far, 214 educational institutes have partnered with HWPL for Peace Education, and it is being conducted in 53 schools. You are looking at photos of students during Peace Education from all over the world.

You can clearly see their passion and energy. Notably, peace education in the

Philippines, India, and Romania is showing great progress. Here, students in the Philippines are making ornaments for a peace park. At Jagadguru Narendracharyaji Maharaj Educational Institute (JNMEI), a school in India, students attend a peace education session titled “The Power to Overcome Coronavirus: Gratefulness.” And in this picture, students in Romania are celebrating completing all 12 chapters of the Peace Education course. Here are students from School of Tiéguéna in Mali and Žebrák Elementary School in the Czech Republic drawing a Tree of Gratitude during their peace camp. Students wrote a reason to be grateful on each leaf.

The Textbook for HWPL Peace Education has two sections with a total of 12 chapters. It guides learners to analyze the fundamental cause and effect of when peace failed, discover answers to restoration and healing, and learn gratitude, sympathy, devotion, understanding, forgiveness, and other important values. Now then, let’s see how students describe what difference Peace Education made for them.

These students will be our future leaders of peace. HWPL Peace Education is positively impacting teachers as well as students. In June, Florent Pasquier, a professor at Sorbonne University, completed the peace educator training course. Mr. Pasquier says peace education should be included in the mandatory curriculum. And in the Commonwealth of Dominica, Octavia Alfred, the Minister for Education & Human Resource Development, proposed to include HWPL Peace Education in the curriculum of all public schools.

M. Florent Pasquier | France | Professor of Sorbonne University

In my case, I don't teach children, but young adults and adults at the Master levels 1 and 2 in education and training. The way HWPL treats peace education programs is clearly the result of a long process of reflection, in which we see a progression. Peace education for students in France seems absolutely necessary to me. It should be a part of the school curriculum. It is no longer an option. It should be a part of a common core of education, of a basic curriculum, so that one at least knows that it exists.

Octavia Alfred | Dominican Republic | Ministry of Education, Minister

We are speaking today about the HWPL peace curriculum, which was introduced into the schools' curriculum in Dominica as part of the health and family life education. HWPL is a wonderful program. We're excited about it. And we know that HWPL will take root in Dominica. And it has already begun. And when this thing is fully implemented, we just cannot wait to see the fruits of that curriculum. And we are sure that Dominica will be sharing the fruits of HWPL with other countries. We are just so glad that we were chosen. We just cannot stop thanking you for choosing Dominica.

The winds of peace caused by education are bringing the global community closer.

C. Peace Education and Peace Monument



Since the Mindanao Peace Agreement was signed in the Philippines in 2014, HWPL and the Mindanao Island have continued to cooperate to help spread a culture of peace throughout the Philippines. On July 19, Cotabato City in Mindanao held an unveiling ceremony of the HWPL Peace Monument—the third of its kind in the city. This peace monument—a form of piled rocks and stones—was made by local citizens who brought rocks from all across Mindanao Island. It is a symbol of solidarity free of division or discrimination and people's hearts and minds brought together for peace.

This culture of peace is surely reaching all shores of the Philippines. The beautiful story of peace in Barangay Foz in the Ilocos Norte region, a

municipality in the northern Philippines, is nothing short of a miracle. For the past year, students took HWPL Peace Education courses. Influencing their parents and the community with peaceful inspirations, the students brought positive change to the local community that once was festered with strife and conflict. Now, Barangay Foz of Ilocos Norte has been transformed into a community of peace, and students and citizens are donating and volunteering to build a garden of peace.

Starting with peace education, our community has become more involved in peace activities. Among these was the "Planting the Trees of Peace Campaign," which serves as a promise to build a peace monument in the future. Just after a month, people of Barangay Foz started to make this promise a reality aiming to contribute this peace monument for the September 18th 7th Anniversary of the World Peace Summit. The land where the peace monument is being erected was donated by the parents of students, who enrolled their children and studied HWPL Peace Education.

What made it more special was when the peace monument became a solution to resolve the conflict between the two families because both of them were fighting over the land, but they decided to donate the land instead to resolve the conflict. The peace park and peace monument became a catalyst to work hand-in-hand together as one community.

People inspired by peace are bringing innovative change. The wind of peace that took off from Mindanao, which is located in the south, is now blowing across the Philippines, reaching its northern region of Ilocos and bearing fruit. If the extraordinary potential of HWPL Peace Education is realized around the globe, a world free of discord and conflict and a world where peace is a norm, may come true.

HWPL will continue to build broader and stronger partnerships through MOUs and MOAs entered with national education entities and work for qualitative and quantitative improvements. 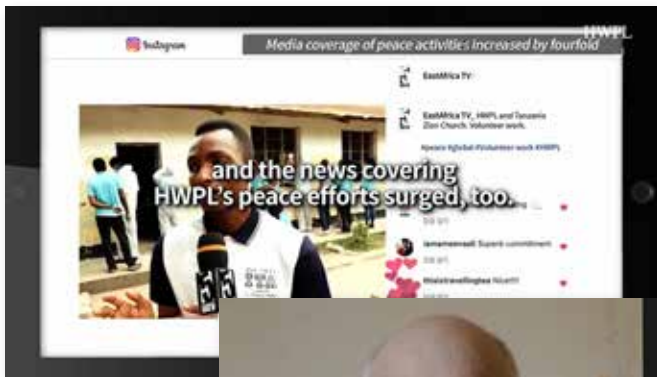

HWPL Peace Education was actively implemented, delivering the value of peace. The IPYG educational programs were made and run so that no one would be isolated.

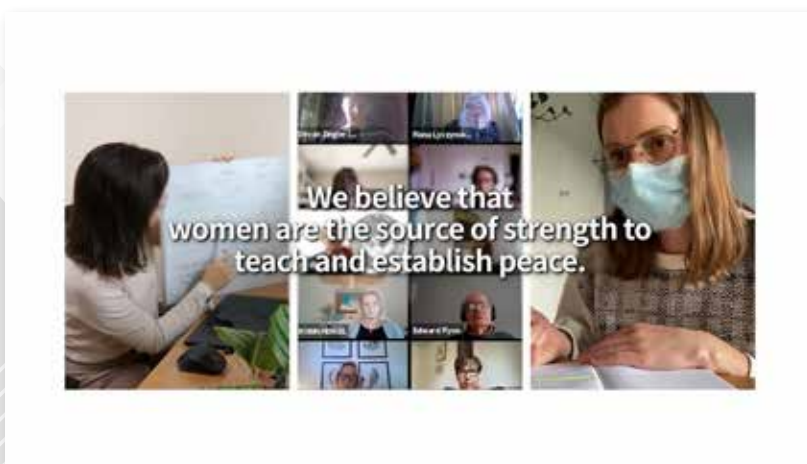


As the world shed many tears, prayers of religious persons grew more sincere. For peace, they had passionate discussions.

Commemorative Speech by HWPL Chairman



Today marks the 7th Anniversary of the September 18th HWPL World Peace Summit. I hope everyone has been well and healthy. Due to the emergence of COVID-19, the world is going through a very difficult time. Dear members of HWPL, with not a single person left behind, let us strive together to reach the destination we all hoped to arrive at. The heavens will protect us. We have made a great deal of effort through the September 18th HWPL World Peace Summit. As we celebrate the 7th anniversary, it is my pleasure to meet everyone.

What is our purpose? It is to bring wars to an end and build a peaceful world to pass it down as a lasting legacy for our future generations. To this end, I have gone on 31 tours across the globe, of which I am sure that you are well aware. To former and incumbent heads of state, chief justices, and speakers of parliaments whom I met during the tours, I would like to express my sincere gratitude. I am also grateful to religious leaders, heads of organizations, and journalists. I visited your countries like a naïve child, yet you had welcomed me so warmly. With one heart and one hope, we have worked hand in hand and I am reminded of those days. On this 7th anniversary of the summit, it is my sincere pleasure to welcome the family of HWPL. The goal that we have will certainly be realized.

Today, the world is groaning under the weight of the pandemic. But that doesn't change the fact that God is alive and that all creation exists. Then we, as higher beings, have no reason to be idle because of the situation. Our goal is still the same. While I was on peace tours circling the globe, I held you in these very eyes and your pleading voices in these very ears. What you had said is still vivid in my mind and alive. Until the day our goal is reached, let us not change. What do we always say? We say, "We are one." We are one. So let us be one and fulfill what we have hoped for.

Some of you may know the backstory of how I started this movement for peace. I used to live in a small town in the deep countryside where my family was farming. When I was a child, I held onto the hands of my grandfather, who dressed in a Korean traditional hat and robe and prayed to God every day. Whenever he did, I prayed with him, holding his hands. Even after my grandfather passed away and I was discharged from the military, I prayed in the field behind this farmer's hut every morning and evening. Why? Because I only knew God. As my grandfather taught me, I knew about God and that he is the source of all blessings, so I always prayed.

Then something unreal happened. One day, a huge bright star in the sky came down to me. It was at about seven meters or so above the ground. There stood before me this brightly shining star, much bigger than me. I was so surprised that I ran into my house. My father was asleep, so I woke him up saying, "A star is here, a star is here." Then my father came out and was amazed by how big and bright the star was. He said, "In old times, a star would show up when a great figure appears. It seems such a figure will arise in our country too." That star appeared to me for three days, and ultimately, guided by the star, I made a promise to God. What was it about? I vowed that I would believe and obey him and that I would keep everything that he commands me to do. Now that I think about it, I am surprised how far back in the past it is.

That is how I started my life as a person of religion. However, as you have heard and seen, while I was on 31 rounds of the world peace tours, have you ever heard me preach religion? I refrained from doing so. To bring peace and cessation of war to the world, I transcended nationality, ethnicity, and religion while visiting various countries, and you have welcomed this humble person with gracious hospitality.

What did those meetings boil down to? It showed that we are one. What is the purpose embodied in this slogan, "We are one"? It is to end all wars and to make a peaceful world to leave it as a lasting legacy for future generations. With such determination and goal, we have met, and I went on global tours again and again for this.

Currently, the pandemic is keeping us from traveling, but our goal and the promise made with God are still intact. If the living God is with us and our goal remains unchanged, what we hope for will become a reality. Hence, under God and the banner of peace, we will together attain this goal. We will do so by being one in heart and mind. When I visited your countries, what did we promise? We promised to be one, with "We are one," and pledged to jointly achieve peace.

So I met people from all walks of life, regardless of their religious or political affiliations. Also, I promised them that I would hold a peace summit in Seoul, Republic of Korea, and accordingly, the HWPL World Peace Summit was held in Seoul, Korea. What was the vow we made at the summit? Political leaders in attendance, they pledged to work on making an international legal instrument that would ensure

a world of peace. What did heads of organizations promise? They promised that they would pour in their efforts to realize peace before God. That is what happened. At the HWPL World Peace Summit, we made these promises before God and all the people of the world. We promised to bring peace and cessation of war worldwide. On that day, the heads of organizations pledged that they would keep pressing leaders to fulfill the promises made before God and all the people. That was the vow, and they signed agreements to do so. If this is a promise made before God and global citizens, then it certainly has to be fulfilled. As long as we are alive, we will keep our promise to God.

The pandemic will be over one day. So we should definitely accomplish our purpose and build a peaceful world free of war. This is not a task someone else will do for us. Since we are the ones who spoke these words and made the commitment, it is our responsibility to fulfill it in our generation.

I am sure that you know. What former and current heads of state, chief justices, and speakers of parliaments have signed are still in the library here. Those agreements that you have signed on that day and

hour are still kept as is. So we should not just sit on our hands and look on at the world. We need to achieve our goal. This will not change. Then, who will do this work? It is us, the family of HWPL. This is also our mission, and there is nothing greater than this. This world was created by God and handed down to us by our ancestors. Should we let wars destroy it? No. That is not love, but destruction. What we need is love. We should love each other as ourselves, and transform this world our predecessors passed down to us into a beautiful place. We should create a world of paradise and make it an unceasing legacy for generations to come. Isn't this what we ought to do? If that is the case, then we need to become one as we promised, as we say "We are one." We should come together as one and accomplish our purpose. We truly need to.

When I visited Africa, members and speakers of parliaments of 55 countries voluntarily gathered and made a promise with HWPL. It was a promise to turn this world into a peaceful place together. That is the pledge we made in South Africa.

What also happened? I went to Australia. There, leaders of island countries convened in one place. They also made a promise and

what was it about? They signed the agreements promising to build a peaceful world and end wars. I still have them with me.

Everyone, in this world, people value things such as wealth and power, but what is more valuable is a peaceful, warless world. Without peace, anything we build will be destroyed in the end. This is why all of us need to cooperate and achieve peace in one heart. We should not forget the day of September 18th. Today marks its seventh anniversary. All the vows we made on that day must not be forgotten. The heavens saw and heard us, and so did the earth. It is only fair that we carry out the promise we made before the heavens and the earth. Would there be anything more reasonable or greater than this?

What is the pinnacle of modern science? The development of nuclear weapons. They can blow up the entire planet in the blink of an eye. Thus, we should bring such wars to an end and establish a lasting paradise full of life to pass it down as an everlasting legacy. Let us make sure that this heart of ours remains unchanged. I have not forgotten about the HWPL family of peace even for a moment. With the mindset that everyone in the global community is the family of HWPL,

I have been working to this day, relentlessly. I'm sure you already know.

When we visited Romania on a world peace tour, there was someone we met at a supreme court. Whenever we made a visit, this person would take us to his house and provide us with lovely meals. He did so every time we visited. I'm still thankful for the kindness he showed us. There were also former and incumbent heads of state who warmly welcomed us, agreed to our proposals, and collaborated with us. How could I forget their gestures of kindness? I was very grateful.

What we have to do once the pandemic recedes is to move forward again towards our goal of global peace and cessation of war. Everyone should do so with one heart, a heart yearning for peace. By doing so, we will need to accomplish our purpose of peace and cessation of war in the end. There is nothing greater than this. Once we die, we cannot do anything, so we should act while we are alive. We should do what we intend to do while we are still breathing. So I would like to take this opportunity to convey this message. I am not a thief. What I hope to achieve is to make this world a beautiful place like

the Garden of Eden. With whom? Together with the family of HWPL. Through our concerted efforts, let us create a wonderful global community. Everyone, let us not change. With God together with us, we should hold his enduring love in our hearts and work with love.

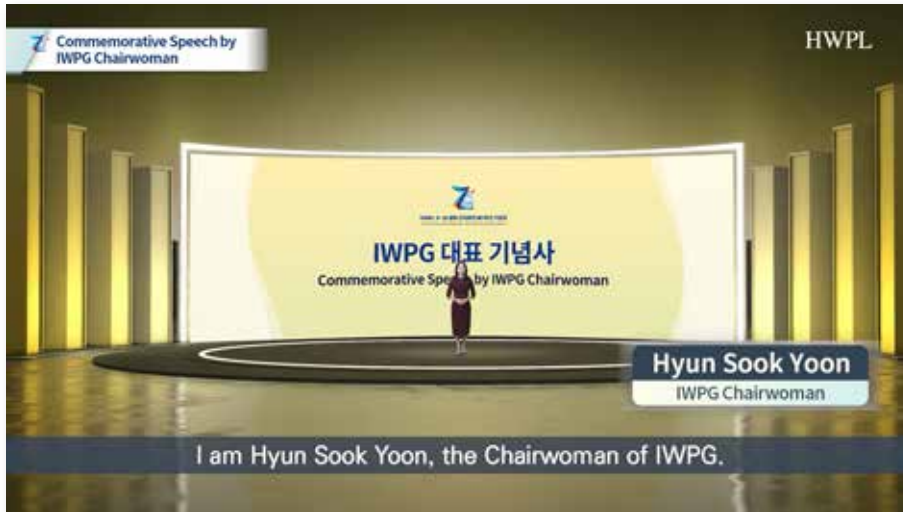

In 2020, I co-organized an offline Peace Lecturer Training Education with Mandalay Peace Committee members. We proceeded with the Peace Lecturer Training Education until the 6th lecture, but due to COVID-19, the offline event was difficult to continue, so (the) Peace Lecturer Training Education was stopped. But COVID-19 couldn't stop our passion for peace education. I hosted an online Peace Lecturer Training Education in 2021 with two peace instructors, and it was the most impressive and meaningful moment. About 60 people applied for the Peace Lecturer Training Education and everyone worked hard in the class, faithfully fulfilling the assignments

given in each lecture. Peace education is a necessary education for Myanmar, which consists of various ethnic groups and people lack peace awareness. So, (through peace education) participants can recognize diversity and embrace each other with a broad mind. Although online Peace Lecturer Training Education has been suspended due to Myanmar's military coup, after the Peace Lecture Training Education is completely over, many people's attitudes and mindsets will be changed. They will become peace messengers and do many peace activities. Thank you.

B. Support and Advocacy for the Establishment of an International Law for Peace



In addition, the IWPG continues to support and urge that the DPCW be established into a binding law. In order to create sustainable peace, the support and urging by civil society around the world is very important. Just as small water droplets gather to form a big river, IWPG has signed MOAs and MOUs with 430 organizations in 130 countries, and is urging for the legalization of the 10 articles and 38 clauses of the DPCW through the Peace Pledge. During the 2021 65th UN Commission on the Status of Women (CSW), which was held online, IWPG had an 'online virtual forum exhibition booth' and participated in 357 online sessions hosted by women's civil society groups to promote IWPG's activities and the DPCW. Many women's civil society groups and members around the world have expressed their willingness to participate in the work of peace.

C. Plant Peace



Everyone, what do our growing children need the most? Isn't it to grow and receive the best education in a safe and abundant environment? Therefore, I think that the best gift for our future leaders is peace. In response, IWPG started the Plant Peace initiative in the hopes of instilling a culture of peace for our children to enjoy, replacing the culture of war, such as discrimination, violence, and conflict.

Since 2018, the Loving Peace Art Competition has been held to draw peace in the hearts of children and youth. In 2021, the International Loving Peace Art Competition was held, in which 5,093 children and youth from 28 countries participated and was able to express their world of peace to their heart's content. Through drawing, our children recognized the preciousness and necessity of peace, and gave hope by presenting the drawings to children suffering from war and conflict. When we look at our children drawing with the love of peace, we realize just how important peace activities are.

On the other hand, in Myanmar, the unfortunate incidents of innocent civilians being sacrificed due to internal conflict are continuing day after day. At the request of the members of the Myanmar branch, IWPG immediately issued a 'Statement to Cease the Bloodshed in Myanmar' and request aid to the United Nations and international organizations. In addition, we jointly issued a statement with civil society groups around the world, calling for the lives of Myanmar people to be protected and all situations to be resolved in a peaceful way. What the people of Myanmar need now is peace. Through this event, I once again earnestly ask that both the government and people stop the violence and resolve it in a peaceful way.

D. IWPG Peace Monument



Peace Families! In order to spread a culture of lasting peace, we must create a world that commemorates peace, not war. IWPG, in cooperation with HWPL, intends to install 'IWPG Peace Monuments' in each country to commemorate the achievements made through the world peace tours, and to reflect the wishes of women around the world for peace. This will help spread peace in each community and urge support for the 10 articles and 38 clauses of the DPCW to be established as an international law.

E. International Women's Peace Center



IWPG will establish the 'International Women's Peace Center' so that the heart of peace will grow in community spaces called "centers" and the potential to be

resources of peace in society will also grow. This will be a solid foundation for achieving peace by encouraging everyone to re-create peace by becoming a peacemaker who can also nurture others as peacemakers. The “International Women’s Peace Center,” which will be held online and offline, will be a space for nurturing talented people who can foster a culture of peace in the region and country by introducing a variety of programs that cultivate the spirit of peace.

Everyone! Our mission is to create a world that is peaceful and safe. I am confident that if everyone here today works together for the establishment of an international law of peace, we will be able to realize world peace in the near future. And all women in the world, please unite as one with IWPG. And family of peace, let us make a world of peace! IWPG, the 3.9 billion women, promises to achieve world peace together with HWPL under one heart and will. We are one! Thank you.

Commemorative Speech by IPYG General Director



Messengers of peace around the world, Hello. I am Youngmin Chung, the director of the IPYG. The youth across the world and IPYG are working passionately to realize the DPCW. Today, allow me to share the progress of a year's work and our plans to establish peace while outrunning the challenges posed by COVID-19.

In 2020 and 2021, the youth were widely affected by the pandemic during the insecure and difficult times. They weathered a disease from a virus infection, a mental health challenge named the COVID-19 blues stemming from social distancing, and was also exposed to cyberbullying. School shutdowns to



contain the spread of COVID caused education disruption for more than 1.6 billion students in over 160 countries. It costs students the opportunity for future development. Moreover, it often exposed young people to violence and human rights violations at homes and workplaces, and some were forced into armed conflicts. Also, students living in poverty had to go starving because school cafeterias were closed.

Amid these challenges, youth leaders who work with the IPYG have strived to build a stable social foundation and help students overcome their sufferings. One youth member from Timor-Leste gave English and Peace Education lessons to students eager to learn and gave them hope. A young gentleman from South Sudan went to neighborhoods with no internet access on a bicycle to educate the community about viruses and sanitation.

A. Youth Empowerment Peace Workshop(YEPW)

To extend the helping hands of the youth, the IPYG worked for solidarity and cooperation of the global youth community. The answer for peace, the DPCW's Article 10 on a culture of peace and peace education aligns with our work. Toward that effort, IPYG first launched a global discussion platform for the youth, the Youth Empowerment Peace Workshop, YEPW. The online workshop which dealt with overcoming the pandemic crisis and building a sustainable future called for the youth to move proactively. In response, the youth joined the workshops hosted by continent. There, they shared the challenges in their region and launched collaborative projects to counter the issues.

Participants in Europe and the Americas discussed the rapidly growing cyberbullying and COVID-19 blues, and as a result, they are carrying out campaigns and classes to address cyberbullying. What emotional distress do victims of school violence experience? In France, participants put themselves in the shoes of the victims, the bullies, and the bystanders in a virtual video simulation game.

Interview



Ms. Marine BOURSERIE | France | Coordinator of IPYG France

We always wondered how we could talk to the youth about cyberbullying in a creative way. As a result, an idea of a game simulation arose through interactive games — a topic of interest for so many youths recently. We were inspired by the concept where the story changes according to the user's decision for each scenario. Many participants said they were impressed by the tremendous immersion and lessons the simulation gave. They became more aware of the consequences of the small choices, and some participants even said it was a time to reflect on their recent words and actions not only in the real world but also in the cyber world as well. We will continue to expand this cyberbullying campaign with much more content, and if the opportunity arises, we even plan to make it into a real online game.

B. Youth Empowerment Peace Class(YEPC)

I think it is a youth-savvy idea tied into the initiative.

Next is Africa and Asia. The youth in these regions discussed ways to resolve education disruption. According to a research by UNESCO, even before 2020, half of the youth from ages 15 to 17 in the regions were unable to attend school, and the pandemic exacerbated the issue. The youth there reached out to the IPYG, and IPYG responded by launching non-formal educational program on an NGO level. It is called the Youth Empowerment Peace Class

or YEPC, which we run with youth members. So far, more than 450 youth from 35 countries have signed up for YEPC. The courses not only provide HWPL's peace education, but also has parent education on the importance of family and parental role, self-wellness education that raises awareness of the dangers of drugs and smoking, and global citizenship education to develop the bearing and conduct of citizens in an era of globalization. Meet the founder & CEO of the Youth Foundation of Bangladesh, who operates these trainings.

Interview 1



Mohammad Safi Ul Alam Bangladesh | Youth Foundation of Bangladesh(YFB), Founder&CEO

You know that many young people are violated their right to study because the Internet infrastructure is not well-established. And young people cannot go to school properly due to the COVID-19 situations. To solve these problems, IPYG [is] interested to discussing youth education rights through the Youth Empowerment Peace Class (YEPC) and proposing solutions according to the situation of each country. I requested to work with IPYG to analyze the current situation and the current status of the local community and come up with appropriate measures to solve the educational rights and problem. The Youth Empowerment Peace Class (YEPC), which [is] called YEPC, is a very great initiative by the IPYG. Through this online platform in the pandemic, IPYG provides good quality education and created opportunities for young people who are not educated at home and even in schools.

It is encouraging that the courses directly helped resolve challenges for the youth. Then what do the participants think about YEPC?

Interview 2



Mr. Ratu Inoke Drauna | Fiji | Director of ARUKA Fiji

As a network engaging needy widows and abandoned, disengaged, idle youth, it was a privilege to be affiliated under YEPW. Therefore, knowing of the courses offered by YEPC. YEPC is a very amazing educational program for youths, for it creates a platform to plan and implement ways to solve social and health prevailing issues. I believe the highlight of our training was HWPL Peace Education and Parent Education, as many participating were able to relate to this and share their childhood testimonies and learn from each other's stories. I believe, after being trained with YEPC, many of our members will now have a structure towards being mindful of their approaches in working with young people. They are also grounded in a good foundation to establish trust, continue with raising awareness, and implement projects to boost the needs of what they had been taught. Therefore, we are so blessed being a part of this training initiative. Thank you, Dhanyavaad and Vinaka Vakalevu.

Interview 3



Mr. Adolfo Paulo Hornay | Timor-Leste | Director of Youth For Peace

Peace education teaches me to know who [I am]. So, my value. And second, [it] teaches me about my influence. So, this is important. I know myself and my influence [on other] people. We need to know our role and our possibility to do the peace activity, peace event, or peace information to pass it to another person, [other] people, [other] young people, who really need peace itself. The Youth [Empowerment] Peace Class made our organization members understand about the peace activities from IPYG and HWPL to develop, expand the IPYG's and HWPL's activities in our family, in our community, in our country, and also, in our Earth as a global citizen.

Now, we've shared with you the IPYG programs YEPW and YEPC. YEPW, which was launched in 2020, has hosted 60 sessions in 50 countries across six continents adding participating individuals and organizations every time.



Recently, we surveyed 179 youth members collaborating with the IPYG. The survey showed that 79% said that YEPW was helpful in providing an opportunity to interact with young people from other countries and participate in a cooperative global network. 78% responded that the YEPW made them realize the youth must take an active role in solving social challenges. In addition, when asked about the necessity of a non-formal education program on an NGO-level, 98% responded they strongly agree or agree. The results show that the IPYG's projects, aimed at realizing the DPCW, is recognized for creating a foundation for healthy, striving communities. Building on these records, the IPYG will continue to expand the youth solidarity and help raise citizens' awareness through YEPW and provide educational courses on YEPC by growing their presence online.

With our persistent efforts and interest, I hope discrimination and separation in the corners of the world will be replaced by peace and harmony. A notable concept in the DPCW is that peace is only possible when all nations and people work together. A great number of youth and citizens are joining the initiative, but more participation is needed to let the effects be felt. Our world is connected now more than ever. So, the global community needs to bring change altogether unless we want to limit the positive effects. I ask everyone here to share this news more often with the youth and people in your home countries, and I ask you to offer them the support and encouragement to work with the IPYG. Ladies and gentlemen, we can do it. Let us go forward together. We are one! Thank you.

About the Event

1. Annual Report of WARP Office Meeting 2021



- After the World Alliance of Religions Agreement was signed in 2014, religious leaders in various countries have been carrying out the work of comparing and verifying their own scriptures at the World Alliance of Religions' Peace (WARP) Office.
- HWPL is currently running 265 WARP Offices in 129 countries as of

September 2021.

- Despite the pandemic, a total of 3,698 Dialogue of Scriptures were held since January 2021 through the efforts of religious leaders in order to achieve peace. It had an increase of 360% compared to last year.

3. Dialogue of Scriptures: About Judgement & Disaster

Q1. Does your religious scripture record God's judgment and disaster on this earth due to the people's sins, faults, and corruption?

(1) **Presenter: Ven. Bhikkhu Buddhapala** India | Mahabodhi KGF (Kolar Gold Fields) Branch Director

Due to widespread evil deeds like killing, lying, backbiting, adultery, ill will and lack of respect for elders, the life span of people reduced to a mere 100 from 80,000. For the sentient beings among whom these things were widespread, their lifespan and beauty declined.

(2) **Presenter: Ven. Dr. Dhammapiya Maha Thero** India | Secretary General of International Buddhist Confederation (IBC)

The disasters can be created or can happen due to natural reasons or they can also happen due to negative human actions. Human beings either suffer or enjoy life due to their Karma (good deeds or evil deeds) as a sequence of causes and conditions under which a person performs it.

(3) **Presenter: Nathanael Lee Schmitz** USA | Instructor of Chicago, the US branch of Shincheonji Church of Jesus

In the history of the Bible, when the sins of man grew too great, judgments and disasters occurred. Yet, even before such events occurred, God would always send prophets beforehand to warn about judgment and disaster (Amos 3:7).

According to Lamentations 3:33, it is not God's will to bring affliction or grief to the children of men. God, in fact, waits patiently to give people chances to repent (2 Peter 3:9).

(4) **Presenter: Swami Vedanand Saraswati** South Africa | Spiritual Head of Arya Samaj South Africa

When it comes to judgement in Hindu philosophy, the Law of Karma is dictated. What we sow, so shall we reap, either in this life or future lives. According to the Vedas, if an individual sows goodness, he or she will reap goodness; if one sows evil, he or she will reap evil. God has established the law of Karma. His law of Karma is precise, strict, uncompromising,

unyielding, and thoroughly impartial.

(5) Presenter: Imam Salim Maina Charo Kenya | Nairobi Country Chairman
of Council of Imams and Preachers of Kenya

The Creator's judgment on the faults and disasters of people on Earth are recorded in the Quran several times. Bad consequences shall not touch wrongdoers only but will also include all people who live with them.

Natural disasters are punishment Allah Subhanahu Wa Taala brings for those people who are either disbelievers or cross his limits (transgression and being extreme in disobedience). It is also recorded in the Quran that they are a test for believers.

(6) Presenter: Priest Bhupinder Singh India | Head priest Gurdware Guru
Teg Bahadar Jalandhar, Punjab

According to the Guru Granth Sahib, those who only do their self-will, not following the Lord's word, are called "Manmukhs." It is recorded that they are full of selfishness, evilness, and greed. The foolish and dogmatic Manmukhs who do only as they please are punished according to their deeds. Even if they pray for happiness, they will suffer greatly and lose honor. This is the punishment for the wrong behavior.

Q2. Does your religious scripture record any judgments or disasters that will come in the world? Is it prophesied? If so, what are they and what is the result?

(1) Presenter: Imam Salim Maina Charo Kenya | Nairobi Country Chairman
of Council of Imams and Preachers of Kenya

In the Hadith, Islamic text, it is recorded that "disasters and diseases will spread. Famine and great disaster will come and rain will not fall. God will let their enemies overpower them and take what is in their hands. Let them fight with each other." (Ibn Majah Book 36, Hadith 4155)

(2) Presenter: Imam Mahmoud Movahedifar Armenia | Blue Mosque of
Yerevan

The hadiths describe several events happening as signs before the Day of

Judgment. During this period, terrible corruption and chaos would rule the earth caused by the Masih ad-Dajjal (similar to the Antichrist in Christianity), then Imam Mahdi will appear defeating the Dajjal and establish a period of peace liberating the world from cruelty. These events will be followed by a time of serenity when people live according to religious values.

(3) Presenter: Fr. Nehme Georges Saliba Lebanon | Parish Priest of St. Peter and Paul Church-Hazmieh Lebanon

Forecasting disasters is also linked to the signs of the end times. In the Bible, these verses (Luke 21:10-11 and 1 Thessalonians 5:3) are examples of the signs of the end times.

We can anticipate Judgment Day by helping every weak person. But looking at Mark 13:32 and Matthew 24:6, we don't know when that time is, so we can only learn to stay awake.

(4) Presenter: Nathanael Lee Schmitz USA | Instructor of Chicago, the US branch of Shincheonji Church of Jesus

In the last book of the New Testament, Revelation, it records prophecy of the events that will happen at the time of the second coming of Christ, including judgment and disaster that will occur all over the world. (Revelation 3:10, Revelation 7, Revelation 18, etc.) In Revelation 18, it speaks of Babylon's sin that piled up to heaven and God remembers her crimes (Revelation 18:5-6). There will be a judgment of fire on Babylon, and it will be judged and will disappear. This is not referring to the ancient country of Babylon, but refers to something metaphorical.

If we could look into the prophecies and fulfillment of the book of Revelation, we would be able to find hope in the new world which will come after all of the hardship that mankind is facing right now.

(5) Presenter: Prabhu Tapas Das Sweden | Temple President of ISKCON Stockholm

Srimad Bhagavad Gita can be called as a common prophecy about the age that we live in. "O learned one, in this iron age of Kali men almost always have but short lives. They are quarrelsome, lazy, misguided, unlucky and above all, always disturbed." So this age, the saints at this time they are concerned about the suffering of the people in this age which is so filled

with unfortunate qualities.

(6) Presenter: Swami Vedanand Saraswati South Africa | Spiritual Head of
Arya Samaj South Africa

Hindu Philosophy does not necessarily share predictions of future events, but rather warns us about the effects of negative choices and actions, especially when exploiting nature.

Q3. Does your religious scripture record the method to save the righteous when God brings judgment and disaster on this earth? If so, what is it?

(1) Presenter: Prabhu Tapas Das Sweden | Temple President of ISKCON
Stockholm

The Lord loves his devotees, he protects his devotees, and he will intervene when they are harassed. He is saving.

(2) Presenter: Swami Vedanand Saraswati South Africa | Spiritual Head of
Arya Samaj South Africa

I would like to take the Mahabharata War as an example. During the war, Sri Krishna, the incarnation of sacred light, led Arjuna, the head of Pandavas, to understanding, inner wisdom, and enlightenment. He gave strength and courage in the disaster which made him win the war since he accepted the wisdom of God.

(3) Presenter: Priest Bhupinder Singh Head priest Gurdwara Guru Teg
Bahadar Jalandhar, Punjab

For those who serve their Guru, there is no punishment at the hands of the messenger of death. Meeting with the true Guru, the world is liberated and finds the door of salvation.

(4) Presenter: Fr. Nehme Georges Saliba Lebanon | Parish Priest of St. Peter
and Paul Church – Hazmieh Lebanon

The name, Jesus, is derived from the Hebrew meaning, "the Lord is salvation." He saves His people from their sins." (Matthew 1:21) To rescue the world, let us first not misunderstand the Holy Book, and then agree that peace is the

quickest way to create God's Kingdom.

(5) Presenter: Nathanael Lee Schmitz USA | Instructor of Chicago, the US branch of Shincheonji Church of Jesus

God, who loves people, sent prophets to save the righteous in the time of judgment and disaster, and to show them the path to salvation to escape judgment and disaster. In the same way also, at the time of Jesus' second coming, in the time of Revelation's fulfillment, God's messenger will come to warn of impending judgment and disaster, and also to make known the place of salvation.

In Matthew 24:15-16, Jesus promised a place of refuge and urges believers to flee to the mountains. These mountains are explained in more detail in the book of Revelation, that is, Mt. Zion, where God is. In the end, it is a place of salvation and shelter that we must flee to and this is also prophesied. This Mt. Zion does not refer to the actual Mt. Zion in the nation of Israel, but it is actually a metaphor that represents a place where God and Jesus will come and be with people.

Conclusion

In each religious scripture, it is commonly recorded that after the time of judgment and disaster, the time of recovery and growth will come again. However, the idea that recovery after judgment and disaster relies on the good deeds of Man and the fundamental recovery of the universe lies in contrast to the idea that it is based on the will, plans and promises of God, the Creator, and that it is the work of salvation by God Himself as the savior, or by a savior sent by Him.

We hope that what each religious scripture records becomes the hope for all humanity and becomes a compass for us. We look forward to this being delivered as the light of life.

Two thousand three hundred people from 75 countries participated in the seminars and discussed topics including domestic violence, women's rights, and minority religions.

HWPL's online seminars provide a platform for peace where governments, local communities, and citizens interact and resolve peace-related issues.

HWPL will continue to bridge members of various groups and levels of society and generate a synergetic effect of peace through the peace platform.

of the deadly disease” and the recent student democratic protest, which also “extended to its neighbor Myanmar after the military in that country staged a coup in the pre-dawn of 1 February.” He added that the demands from protest are to be taken seriously “to bring genuine democracy, stability and peace to the country.”

2) Recommendations

After the Q&A sessions, discussions, and comments in the webinar, the following recommendations were drafted and agreed by the participating journalists and HWPL as a result of the event to endorse continued support for and engagement in peacebuilding through international cooperation in journalism.

10 Recommendations

- 1 In a lack of information and misinformation brought by the pandemic, rebuilding communication channels to better access to shared data and research to overcome social (physical) distancing is required.
- 2 Acknowledging that producing misinformation from media agencies is witnessed, the media shall pay special attention to their role of generating news after performing fact-checks.
- 3 Reminding that misinformed beliefs can cause detrimental effects on families, communities, and countries, the media is responsible for formulating the idea that every individual can contribute to the public interests by acquiring knowledge and applying the necessary skills distinguished from misinformation.
- 4 Confirming that the media are the best channel of communication in the international community for sharing the data needed for citizens, journalists shall engage in building cooperative partnerships to effectively fight against the COVID-19 and the related social harm stemming from it.
- 5 International journalists shall seek collaboration with global actors including governments, international organizations, civil society, and local and national media agencies to develop capacity-building and

policymaking aimed at training journalists and producing news contents aimed at boosting ideas of international cooperation for peace.

- 6 Professionalism to target reliability of media with handling sources of information needs to be sought, which will also lead to clarifying better pictures of situations by understanding the context and avoiding the discrepancy between news reports and the reality.
- 7 Understanding that environmental degradation can be facilitated by human activities and harms the lives of people, the media shall deliver information to raise awareness of the environmental situations without manipulation so that action plans to maintain sustainable development with environmental protection can be pursued.
- 8 Understanding that the pandemic created both disease and non-disease damages, international journalists are encouraged to continue to pay their attention to the need for international assistance for joint progress, especially for those areas that suffer from the loss of basic needs such as relief, health service, and public education.
- 9 Being aware that the democratic system is secured by election, rule of law, democratic institutions, human rights agencies, peaceful change of government, and other means, international journalists are encouraged to advocate democratic values shared by the international community through covering the related news.
- 10 Recalling the purposes and principles of the international documents signed by states to secure global peace and human security, international journalists are encouraged to provide necessary information about international law for peace and elevate the level of cases relating to peace at an international level so that global citizens can appeal to the international community to pursue their freedom and rights.

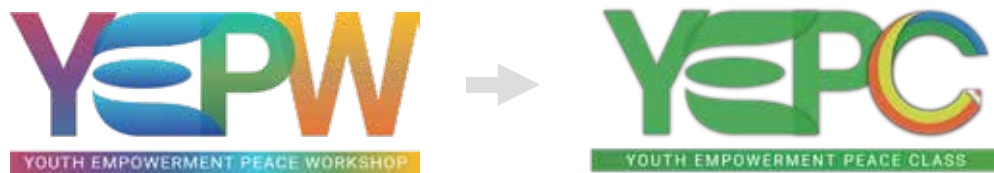

What is Youth Empowerment Peace Class (YEPC)?

It is an NGO-led non-formal education program designed as a peace classroom by the IPYG and youth organization leaders to provide more educational opportunities for youth. The YEPC began in July of this year, and 500 young adults from 37 countries are participating. The first class graduated in September, and the program still continues to this day.

Initiative Background



The IPYG brought youth together in the Youth Empowerment Peace Workshop (YEPW) to share current social issues and discuss possible solutions. Many of the youth stated that “lack of educational opportunities for youth” was an issue.

*Workshop topics per continent

- Africa: Lack of educational infrastructure and ways to provide educational opportunities
- Asia and Oceania: Environmental pollution, lack of education for youth due to terror and ways to provide educational opportunities
- Europe and Americas: Preventing school violence and cyber violence

According to UNESCO’s “Out of School Youth” report, 42% of Sub-Saharan African youth aged 16 to 19 (upper secondary school age) do not attend school, and 68% of youth living in poverty do not attend school. In the case of Oceania, Middle Asia and South Asia, 38% and 30% of youth do not attend school. Increasing educational opportunities is slow and many youths are losing opportunities for education because Covid-19 has made public education more difficult in many countries.

In order to solve this problem, the IPYG began many projects with youth around the world, and one of them is the YEPC, which is an NGO-led non-official educational program in response to the lack of educational opportunities for youth.

Initiative Summary

- Participants: Anyone who is registered under the IPYG, regardless of age and position
- Purpose
 - To provide education to youth around the world who do not have a chance at education and to find youth leaders with potential in various communities
 - Slogan: Education for All, for Youth, for You

 - Required Course : HWPL Peace Education

Education that teaches how to resolve conflicts and achieve peace and makes students become peace messengers who practice and spread peace by internalizing values for peace.
 - Elective Courses: Only provided to those who apply in advance
 - 1) Global citizenship Education: Education to teach leadership and knowledge to live as a global citizen
 - 2) Making self-wellness Education: Education to teach youth to keep themselves healthy from drugs, smoking, etc.
 - 3) Parent Education: Education to teach the value of life and how valuable each person is to create a happy family.
- Expected Impact
 - The graduates will teach youth who cannot access education in their communities to create an action-based platform for youth to help each

other and share knowledge to improve themselves.

- Everyone will have an opportunity and right to learn through the YEPC, just like the UN SDG's goal of "leave no one behind", and it is expected to help fulfill the 4th SDG, "Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all."

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World Peace Summit Calls for Concerted Action for Sustainable Peace in the New Normal Era

The organizer of the event, Heavenly Culture, World Peace, Restoration of Light (HCWL), has been conducting citizen-centered peacebuilding activities to create "a culture of peace" advocated by the UN and international community

The 7th Anniversary of the September 18th HCWL World Peace Summit has been held online. This year's event dealt with the progress of international efforts and the plans to promote the peace agenda in the 'New Normal' era shifting from the post-Covid to the with-Covid.

The organizer of the event, Heavenly Culture, World Peace, Restoration of Light (HCWL), has been conducting citizen-centered peacebuilding activities to create "a culture of peace" advocated by the UN and international community to set up an environment of peaceful coexistence since the World Peace Summit in 2014.

This event presented the concerted action for sustainable peace with cases from various sectors such as international law, religion, education, and the media. Also, it addressed international cooperation to overcome the current crisis that threatens the coexistence and harmony of mankind, which has come to the fore during the pandemic.

Peacebuilding efforts led by HCWL to establish legal foundations and international norms for peace through connecting global actors are embodied with its effort to advocate the international law for peace by drafting the Declaration of Peace and Cessation of War (DPCW).

"The DPCW Handbook enables us to systematically teach international law and the essence of peace to these students and others. It enables them to become lecturers in the following course," said Dr. Mizanur Rahman, Chief Advisor of Asian Association of Law Professors (AALP) as well as Former Chair of National Human Rights Commission, Bangladesh (NHRC-02), highlighting the need to encourage public discourse on peacebuilding by academia.

In addition to the basic principles of peace assigned to nations to uphold, the DPCW has presented principles that should be dealt with in the present era, such as prohibiting the use of force, fostering religious freedom, and civic participation to spread a culture of peace. In particular, it states that efforts for peace come from all members of the global society by identifying not only nation-states but also international organizations and all citizens as the main actors of building peace.

"We know that it will be hard to achieve peace if we are not all working for it. This is why we need to encourage children, the youth, and adults to prevent verbal abuse and work towards reducing inequalities and eradicating disparities to achieve a more equitable, stable, and peaceful world," said Former President of Ecuador, Dr. Rosalia Arteaga Serrano.

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Hon. Octavia Alfred, Minister of Education, Human Resource Planning, Vocational Training, and National Excellence of Dominica, said that the students learn the necessity of mutual coexistence and cooperation through HCWL peace education and pass on to their friends, parents, and teachers what they have learned. She addressed it also deals with concepts that can develop psychosocial competency skills, such as respect for diversity, order, conflict resolution, and negotiation, so it is being used for teacher's training.

"Our objective is to end wars in the global village and establish peace and make it a permanent legacy for future generations. Without peace, everything that we managed to build would be destroyed. ... We should not let this happen. So, to achieve peace, shouldn't we achieve our objective with the same spirit?" said Chairman Man Hee Lee of HCWL at the event.

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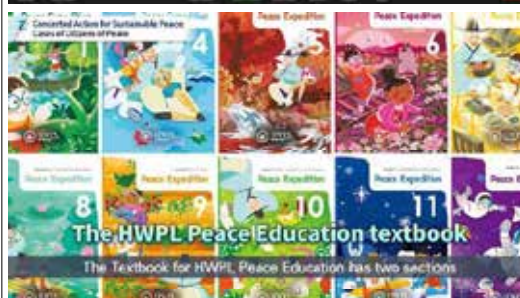
